**Title** Computational pipeline for computing probability of modification from structure probing experiment data

**Description** This is a probabilistic modelling pipeline for computing per- nucleotide posterior probabilities of modification from the data collected in structure probing experiments. The model supports multiple experimental replicates and empirically corrects coverage- and sequence-dependent biases. The model utilises the measure of a ``drop-off rate" for each nucleotide, which is compared between replicates through a log-ratio (LDR). The LDRs between control replicates define a null distribution of variability in drop-off rate observed by chance and LDRs between treatment and control replicates gets compared to this distribution. Resulting empirical p-values (probability of being ``drawn" from the null distribution) are used as observations in a Hidden Markov Model with a Beta-Uniform Mixture model used as an emission model. The resulting posterior probabilities indicate the probability of a nucleotide of having being modified in a structure probing experiment.

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# Description

This function computes posterior probabilities of chemical modification in a structure probing experiment. It uses empirical p-values, which quantify the difference between LDRs (log-ratios of drop-off rates) from treatment-control and control-control experimental comparisons, as observations in a HMM with an emission model defined as a Beta-Uniform mixture.

distribution (emission model of the HMM for the modified state). If optimisation is to be used, the variable should be set to the desired tolerance for parameter estimation (once the estimates stop changing within this tolerance, the algorithm

stops). Set to NULL by default.

#### **Details**

The function first computes percentiles of LDR null distributions, for each percent from 1 to 89 and for a tenth of a percent from 90 to 100. If multiple nucleotide patterns are used, then null distributions are computed separately for each pattern. Then, LDRs from treatment-control comparisons are compared to the percentiles of a corresponding null distribution via computing the p-values, defined as 1 - closest percentile. Thus, if the closest percentile to an LDR is 99th, then its p-value will be 0.01, reflecting a small probability for it to be from this null distribution. The p-values are then used as observations in a hidden Markov model. P-values corresponding to multiple comparisons at the same nucleotide position are considered to be independent measurements.

HMM has a binary latent state corresponding to the true state of a nucleotide, modified or unmodified. Transition probabilities are set according to the empirically derived expectations of unmodified nucleotide stretches of average length 20 and modified stretches of average length 5. Emission probabilities come from a Beta-Uniform mixture, where the Uniform component represents the conditional model for the unmodified state, and the Beta component represents the conditional model for the modified state. The shape parameters of Beta distribution are set to (1, 10) to approximately match the likelihood under the null hypothesis (unmodified state) for the LDRs in the top quintile of the distribution.

We also provide an option to optimise the shape parameters of Beta distribution with the EM algorithm. To do this, make the function call with the last parameter optimise set to the desired tolerance, within which the parameter estimates are allowed not to change at the next iteration. The EM algorithm is run for 10 iterations and each M-step is performed with Newton's optimisation method and is allowed 20 iterations. We remark that during our experiments, this optimisation appeared vulnerable to local minima. Thus, the default version of the pipeline does not use this optimisation.

### Value

An n-by-2 matrix of posterior probabilities for all selected nucleotides. First column corresponds to the probability of the nucleotide being unmodified (given the observations) and the second column

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- to the probability of the nucleotide being modified. Those nucleotides not belonging to stretches for which the HMM was run are assigned an 'NA'.

#### **Error**

The following errors are returned if:

"Number of control and treatment replicates must be at least 2." the number of control or treatment experimental replicates is less than 2;

"All lists of positions selected for pair-wise comparisons should be non-empty." a list of nucleotides for control-control or treatment-control comparisons is empty;

"Strand should be either plus or minus, specified with a sign." strand is not specified as "+" or "-";

"The list of considered nucleotide positions should be non-empty. If patterns are not used, a vector with all positions should be provided in the first element of the list." the list of considered nucleotides (which should either correspond to patterns if addressing sequence bias or list all positions) is empty;

"The matrix of control-control (treatment-control) LDRs should have as many columns as there are control-control (treatment-control) comparisons." dimensionalities of matrices with LDRs do not agree with the number of pair-wise comparisons;

"Please provide a tolerance if shape parameters are to be optimised with EM algorithm." the optimise parameter was not set to a (real) tolerance value.

Function to compute continuous stretches of nucleotide positions.

# **Description**

This function computes continuous stretches of nucleotide positions, for which posterior probabilities are to be computed. Such positions should have the minimum allowed coverage (as defined with the parameter t) in all experimental replicates and a non-zero drop-off count in at least one of the treatment replicates. The returned stretches are at least two nucleotides long.

### **Description**

This function finds all occurrences of a nucleotide pattern in the sequence. For each occurrence, the function returns the index of the middle nucleotide, computed as: ceiling(length(pattern) / 2). The function supports data for the plus and minus DNA strands; for the minus strand, all patterns are turned to complementary sequence.

# **Details**

This function uses stringi::stri\_locate\_all\_fixed().

This function aims to assist with addressing sequence bias in structure probing data. The sequence in the neighbourhood of a nucleotide is assumed to have an effect on its structural state. By considering sequence patterns of a certain length (specified by the user), this function finds indices of the middle nucleotide of each pattern's occurrences within the sequence. We then separately analyse the nucleotides occurring in the middle of each pattern, taking into account sequence dependency.

#### Value

This function returns a list where each component corresponds to a pattern (indicated by the field names) and contains indices of the middle nucleotides of that pattern's occurrences within the sequence.

The following errors are returned if:

"Strand should be either plus or minus, specified with a sign." strand is not specified as "+" or "-";

"The sequence should be non-empty." provided sequence is empty;

"The list of patterns should be non-empty." the list of patterns to search for in the sequence is empty.

The following errors are returned if:

"Number of control and treatment replicates must be at least 2." the number of control or treatment experimental replicates is less than 2;

"Nucleotide selection should have two elements." "All lists of positions selected for pair-wise comparisons or for which posteriors will be computed should be non-empty." the list containing positions of nucleotides selected for control-control and treatment-control comparisons does not have 2 elements or any of the elements is empty;

"Drop-off rate matrix should not have any NA entries." the drop-off rate matrix has NA entries.

# **Description**

A SummarizedExperiment container storing the genomic sequence of the yeast rRNA 18S and three matrices with coverage, drop-off count, and drop-off rate information for each nucleotide position in three replicates of control and treatment DMS structure probing experiments.

# Usage

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#### **Format**

An instance of the SummarizedExperiment class storing data obtained in a structure probing experiment for the yeast rRNA 18S using the DMS chemical probing agent. The data can be accessed in the Gene Expression Omnibus with the code GSE52878.

The available data types are summarised in three assays: coverage, drop-off count of the reverse transcriptase, and drop-off rate at each nucleotide position. The coverage and drop-off count data are obtained in a random-primed paired-end sequencing structure probing experiment. The drop-off rate is computed as the ratio between the drop-off count and coverage at each nucleotide position. Control (no reagent added) and treatment experiments are available in triplicates.

The data from each assay is summarised in a rectangular matrix. The rows represent nucleotide position and the columns represent experimental replicates. The replicates are labelled as "control" or "treatment", which is stored as column data and can be accessed through the field replicate. The row data stores the associated DNA sequence, represented with a DNAString object.

#### **Details**

The SummarizedExperiment object can be created from individual matrices and the sequence string as follows. Below:

seq a string storing the genomic sequence

covFile a matrix storing coverage information, with rows as nucleotide positions and columns as experimental replicates (control replicates come first, followed by treatment replicates)

docFile a matrix storing drop-off count information, arranged as covFile

dorFile a matrix storing drop-off rate information, arranged as covFile

The seq, covFile, docFile, and dorFile are also provided as accompanying data sets for reference.

#### **Details**

The variance is reduced by sorting all LDRs in the null distribution by the average coverage and splitting the data in bins. Each bin spans a coverage of 100; or, if maximum coverage is not larger by 100 than the minimum coverage, the range is set to their difference divided by 10.

For each bin, the 95th quantile of LDRs with subtracted mean and the average coverage are computed. Then non-linear least squares are used to fit the following model (with parameters k, b):  $f = \frac{1}{\sqrt{r}}$  for f - quantiles, n - mean coverage in the bin.

All LDRs are then rescaled by this model according to their corresponding average coverage in the pair of replicates.

# **Error**

The following errors are returned if:

"Number of control and treatment replicates must be at least 2." the number of control or treatment experimental replicates is less than 2;

"All lists of positions selected for pair-wise comparisons should be non-empty." a list of nucleotides for control-control or treatment-control comparisons is empty;

"The coverage and drop-off count matrices should not have NA entries." the coverage and drop-off count matrices have NA entries;

"Unable to fit the model for correcting the coverage bias." The function nls could not execute successfully. The 95th quantiles of the LDR distribution in each bin could be equal to 0 or not have enough elements. This would happen if not enough nucleotides end up in a bin; e.g. one nucleotide per bin.
